Students may select their own books from the open stacks They are urged to use this privilege. In so doing, there is the opportunity to gain a fuller appreciation of the resources of the library. Readers are requested not to replace the books but to leave them on the tables. The library administration provides for the reshelving of all books. A misplaced book is a lost book All books taken from the stacks must be charged at the Loan Desk. These books are issued for one week, and may be renewed for another week if not in demand. Only three books may be charged to one individual for home use. There is a fine of two cents a day for overdue books from the open stacks. The maximum charge will not exceed the value of the book. Reserve Section.

Just to the left of the entrance to the library is the reserve readings may be obtained. These books are shelved by call numbers under the names of individual instructors. They may be secured from a desk assistant by asking for them by author and title, or may be secured by the reader himself if he knows how

Reserve books may be used in the library for a period of one hour and are not transferable. If there is no demand for the book the time of use is not limited to one hour. At 3:00 o'clock reserve books may be withdrawn for home use
