Entire Squad Contributes In Easy Triumphs; Lower Hatters 16 - 2 in Rain

Trojans Defeat Soldiers in One-Sided Match; Top Tars 11 1/2 - 6 1/2

Saturday afternoon, the powerful Trojan golfing squad continued their victory march against their collegiate opponents by crushing the visiting Stetson University linksmen of Deland in a one-sided match, 16 to 2, as they racked up their third consecutive win of the season.

Previous sections over Rollins college and the Kentucky Military Institute cadets had placed the Utopian swingers in the favorite role, and they filled the position to perfection as they lowered the Hatters into the depths of defeat.

Led by Phil Nunn, No. 1 man on the local golf ladder, the Trojans disregarded the rain-soaked course and every match against the Deland opponents, and placed themselves among the top positions in the state and southern golfing circles. Nunn, shooting a low 74, barely nosed out "Duke" Gilbert, Stetson ace, in the closest match of the afternoon. Gilbert carded a 75, and lost his chance of beating the St. Pete player when he laid a long drive into the top of a tall palm and it failed to come down. Deciding it would be a tough shot from that position, Duke threw a putter up at the ball. The ball came down but his troubles were far from over as the putter remained in the air. Finally it was necessary to climb the tree to retrieve the elusive club. Before the disorganized player could regain control, Phil had him in the bag.

All of the St. Petersburg players broke 80 as Athletek defeated Campbell, 75-82, the J. C. swinger carding the second low score of the match along with Gilbert. Bill Knauer won by five strokes over Roberts, 77-82.

Bill Bond, coming up into the varsity ranks from the No. 8 position in the place of Mack Wing, took the measure of Anderson in a 79-87 fashion. Wing was confined to his bed with a slight case of influenza. The Trojans will meet the Hatters in a return engagement April 3 in Deland, after their match the day previous against the University of Florida Gators in Gainesville.
