(Continued from page 1) and they help him to organize his material. Tests force students to apply accurately what they have learned. I don't believe I could get students to work without them. I suggest semester tests, rather than monthly ones.—Lewis.

We poor teachers spend more time marking those tests than the students do in studying for them. I advocate sprung tests, for I believe the students are prone to cram in their month's work the night before examination.—Porter.

Tests are the best and only satisfactory measuring stick which we have to grade students with. Writing material down on a test helps the student to fix it in mind. I prefer frequent short quizzes. In large classes tests are the only possible method of grading.—Holmes.

Tests are of value only to some people. I give tests to see how students are reacting, and not to judge them from the standpoint of grading. I believe in giving exemptions to good students. The fewer tests we need to give, the better. As classes improve to the point of perfection, tests will become unnecessary.—Ervin.
