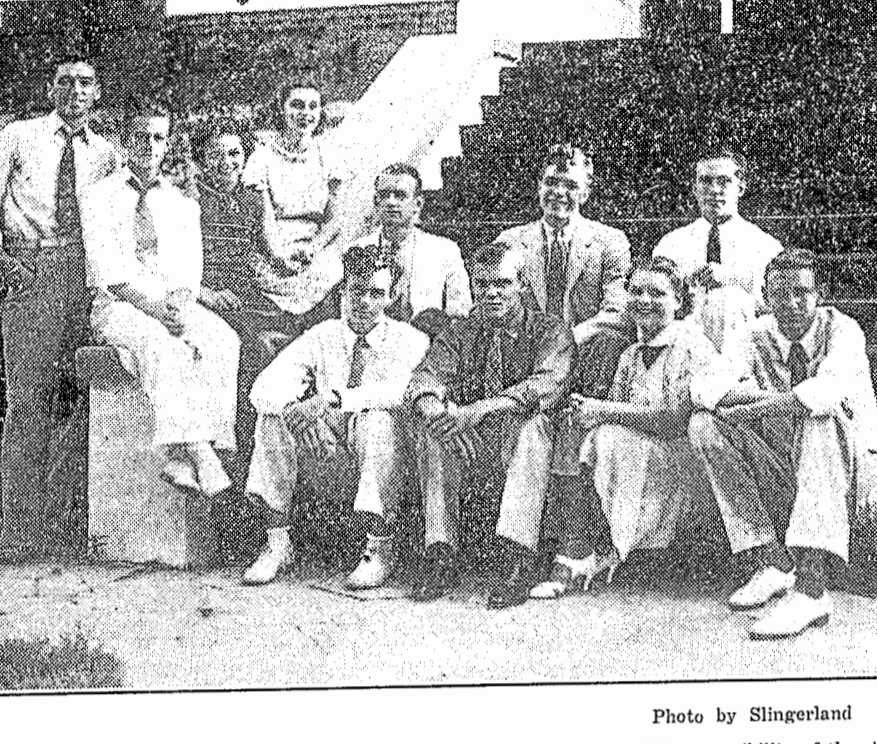

Figures Show Trend In Dating, Sleeping

By Esther Howarth How would you like to be approached by a comparative stranger and asked about your love life...well, anyway, not exactly, but some of it does concern love or fear love, or just plain platonic friendship, depending on the person.

Many students were a little bit surprised and still more embarrassed when the enquiring reporter asked such personal questions as "How many dates do you have per week?" "What's the average amount of sleep you get per night?" "Do you date the same guy or boy?" "What's the average amount of studying you do per day?" and last but not third "Do you believe in dating week-ends only?"

A total of fifty-two students were interviewed. Here are the vital statistics classed as to club and non-club members:

The K. T. club members show an average of eight hours sleep per night (or day) three hours and ten minutes per week.

Pyramids sleep less and study more it seems, for their average sleep time is six and four fifths, or one hour and four fifths, and data eight tenths per week.

Dean's List Of Honor Is Announced

Nottingham, Miller, Nunn, Have Straight "A" Average

Three students at the St. Petersburg Junior College received straight A averages for the first grade period it was announced by Registrar Nina M. Harris. They are Sue Nottingham, Junior, who is carrying 18 hours work; Peggy Miller, sophomore, with 17 hours work; and Phillip Nunn, sophomore, who is taking 16 hours work.

Juniors On Lead

The largest percentage of students on the Dean's list comes from the junior class, 16.1 per cent; the freshman are next with 7.8 per cent. To qualify for this list a student must be registered for a minimum of 15 semester hours work, in which he makes an average of 2.3 honor points. Honor points are figured as follows: Each semester hour of C gives one honor point, B gives two honor points, A gives three honor points, D (fail) disqualifies the student for the list.

The complete list in order of rank is as follows: Sue Nottingham, Peggy Miller, Phillip Nunn, 3 honor points; Harriett Barnholt, 2.86; Leland Robinson, 2.73; Esther Mann, 2.66; Marion Fernholm, 2.61; Dan Hall, 2.6; Alice Whitman, 2.571; Tom LeFevre, 2.529; Frank Howarth, 2.529; Frank Hull, and Betty Markham, 2.473; Wilma Price, 2.4705; L. P. Meares, 2.411; Ariene McKee, and Marja Fourless, 2.4; Patricia Parkin and Marjorie Childs, 2.375; Sue Duncan and Jane Wierick, 2.368; Sam Messner, 2.352; Lillian All-Jerdice, William Kyle, Frank Lee, William Perival, 2.333, 130, Pilkington, 2.312.

The secret of their low two average is because they have two women mates among them!

The girls' clubs show the H. C. C. average highest in sleep and dating: 8-4-11 and 4-8-11 respectively and dating 1-1-1 a week.

The Diddoes are 1-2-3 hour sleepers on the L. H. Ls.—3-1-2 a day. Average shows 3-2-7 and they sleep about seven hours, one fourth less than the L. H. Ls. score.

The greatest dates seem to be the Diddoes with 3-1-6 a week, L. H. Ls. next with 3 and Arnpur is 2-2-7.

The non-club girls study most 4-1-6 hours a day and date 1-1-3 on an average per week.

Are Your Grades Good Or Bad? Why?

Grades are now out and to some there is bitter disappointment and to others the pleasant glow of satisfaction may be determined in their faces. To those who are upset because of bad or unfavorable grades, do not be so unhappy. If you are consistent you may have received more from the course than those that have a better grade than you. If you didn't study, you still have a chance.

If you won't study and expect to get a good grade just because you think that you can "pull the wool over the eyes" of the professor, disillusion yourself. "At your earliest possible convenience." Your instructor will do every thing in his or her power to help you "make the grade" if you are willing to help yourself.

It only takes a little time from some favorite pastime to do some study and it is a lot easier to be able to give even a shade of the right answer, which shows that you are at least trying, than to be the victim of an embarrassing statement which shows, nine times out of ten that you haven't even "cracked the book" in an attempt to find the right answer.

Bewildering as it may seem, an instructor can usually tell whether you have or have not tried in the course. If you haven't, the instructor will try to interest you and do all in his power to help you attain an interest in the course.

If you set yourself with the old determined "no soap" attitude, said instructor will eventually give up and do something that is more to his liking and leave you to the horrors of the book and class, which will give you the time to figure up all for yourself that he doesn't care whether you pass the course or not because he won't help you.

You're dogged right he doesn't care whether you pass his course or not. When he went to college, and he did, he had to get his work on his own hook, and his instructors were no doubt a lot harder on him than he is on you. They probably didn't allot him as much time as he is allotting you but he knows that the work is as hard for you as it was for him. Probably he wants to make it as easy for you to understand as he can.

If he makes an assignment and you don't get it, that isn't his worry. He is anxious that you get the idea of the work but it is up to you to learn it, as he can't pour it in as if you were milk in a picher. If you've never, you have tried, and just can't see "see through" what the professor is trying to explain, and get a low grade because you don't just grasp the point of the subject, have no fear. Usually you will see what is wrong. Perhaps you are taking courses that are new to your disposition or talents that are harnesses are to a team of horses. Although it is rather heartbreaking at the time, it is easier to find it out early in life than to have to suffer the same illusions when you are twenty or twenty-five years older than you are now.

An American Doctor's Odyssey by Victor Heiser, M. D.

Here is the record of a remarkable man who in the past fifteen years has traveled in forty-five different countries watching one disease after another disappear from the lists of the menaces to mankind.

Let an orphan by the Johnstown flood, he later joined the U. S. Medical Service, and still later became a member of the staff of the Rockefeller Institute in which especially he made six-year voyages around the world coming into contact with a mass of people, making observations on scores of subjects, and keeping interesting records of scientific import. His adventures in the Philippines, Polynesia, Hawaii, North Borneo, Java, Fiji, India, Egypt and Ethiopia, and among kings and tribal chiefs, soldiers and head hunters, physicians and witch doctors, millionaires and the humblest of men, all ring with excitement and triumph.

One of the most enjoyable magazines that I have ever handled is a new book about the size of the "Reader's Digest," called "Coronet."
